We had another amazing meeting with room packed full of eighty(!) energized and happy succulent plant lovers! Our speaker, Attila Kapitany did a fantastic presentation on Succulents of Australia, sharing photos of species so different than we have in the US. Annie Morgan and her talk on Gasterias were also great and very informative.

Eight new members joined our club at the meeting and as of this week and we now have 172 members. Fifty-four people have joined so far this year! When I first joined 10 or 12 years ago membership was around sixty-five. Please help welcome them and answer any questions they may have as they get the hang of all that goes on at our meetings.

We also need volunteers to help with the event overall and there are many areas that we can use some help. Please contact Brita Miller if you'd like to volunteer but haven't yet signed up.

October 24 and 25, 2015 PCSS Plant Show Rules

- 1. The Show is open to all paid members of the Palomar Cactus and Succulent Society.
- 2. Plants should be properly identified with their botanical names. There will be books available to check for names before the Show.
- 3. Entries must be in the possession of exhibitors for at least six months. Plants must be clean, (no weeds or debris) and healthy (no insects, disease or pesticide odor). Any plants showing evidence of either will be disqualified. Plant labels should be removed or hidden.
- 4. Entries are judged on: a) Condition size, maturity and difficulty of culture: 70% b) Staging pot, top dressing, arrangement, and cleanliness: 25% c) Nomenclature: 5%
- 5. Entry cards will be available at the Show. You will get to keep part of each card. The Judges' Clerks will collect the other half. Place the card next to the plant with your name hidden. Choose your category on the Honor System.
- 6. Advanced entries will use WHITE cards; Intermediate entries will use YELLOW cards; Novice entries will use GREEN cards.
- 7. There will be awards for Advanced, Intermediate and Novice entries. There will be prizes for the Best Cactus, Best Succulent, Best in Show and Judge's Choice.
- 8. All entries must be here, cards completed, and plants in position by 10:20 AM on the day of the Show.
- 9. The Judges will consider staging and containers affecting the overall presentation in their decisions.
- 10. One plant per pot unless entered as a dish garden.
- 11. Plants will be entered into classes as listed below. One person may enter as many plants as desired in a class.
- 12. The awards will be as follows: First, Second and Third Place, Advanced, Intermediate and Novice, for each Class; Best Succulent; Best Cactus; Best of Show; Judge's Choice.
- 13. The Judges may, at their discretion, divide the entries in any class into two classes by size as may be appropriate for the plants entered. Ribbons will be awarded for each of the new classes.
- 14. Cristate and Monstrose plants may be entered into the Division and Class determined by its genus or may be entered into Division 3, Class #68.
- 15. Plants that have won a Best of Division or Best of Show within the past two years are not eligible for competition.





After our fantastic presentation by Attila Kapitany we wanted to let you know that we have three of his books and give you a brief overview. All of his books are relatively short but packed full of glossy color photos of an amazing array of succulents (and a few cactus).

A favorite is SUCCULENT CARE AND HEALTH, which explains everything you need to know about the care and health of succulents. It gives excellent advice for beginners to the hobby, providing answers to the following questions: "Where to grow them; Repotting; Fertilizing; Seasonal Changes; Pests and Diseases; Choosing a Container; Recognizing Healthy Plants; Handling Spiny Plants; Basic Propagation; Natural Remedies" – and much more.

SUCCULENT SUCCESS IN THE GARDEN explores six gardens, ranging from an inner city courtyard to a rural property. It shows how succulents can be used in the most amazing ways in garden environments: seaside gardens, hillside country, farmlets, and inland gardens, plus city courtyards, suburban nature strips and more. Recommended plantings of different species are given, showing flower color, shade tolerance, pot suitability, indoor/outdoor situations, height, spread, more. Echeverias, sedums, crassulas, senecios, yuccas, aloes and many more are detailed and described.

SUCCULENT PROPAGATION is 112 pages of excellent photos, charts, etc., and provides detailed step-by-step trade secrets on how to propagate both the easy and more difficult species, including a 40 page section on "Propagation by Genus". If you think there is nothing more to learn about succulent propagation beyond pushing a few leaves or stems into a pot than you are going to be surprised and pleased by all the outstanding information this book offers.

Atilla also co-authored SUCCULENTS FOR THE GARDEN and MORE SUCCULENTS FOR THE GARDEN.
