
### This Month's Presentation:

# Spiny Succulents By Jeff Moore

Jeff will speak about his new book, Spiny Succulents, which is a follow-up yin to the yang of the last book on soft succulents. It covers cacti, euphorbias, pachypodiums, alluaudias, terrestrial bromeliads, and a few other succulent-adjacent xerophytes, most but not all spiny. While he can't cover all of each family or genus in one book, this one tries to show cultivated examples of the most prominent cacti, euphorbias, pachypodiums, alluaudias, xerophytic bromeliads, cycads, and other mostly spiny plants.


The presentation basically follows the flow of the book, and he will offer insights on the plants as he goes, and as always will be happy to answer questions. This new book is 350 pages with 1500 images and is a delight to read.

Jeff Moore has owned and operated Solana Succulents, a retail nursery in Solana Beach, since 1992. # Plant of the Month - Opuntias By Lorie Johansen

Opuntia, commonly called prickly pear, is a genus in the Cactaceae family. It is the most widespread of all genera in the cactus family with 300+ species, many being edible. The genus occurs naturally throughout North and South America from Canada, down to the Caribbean, and to the south into Argentina. However, they are now found world-wide as it has escaped

cultivation and has naturalized even to the point of being classified as a noxious weed. Many species are native to Southern California and Baja California where it grows in our coastal sage scrub and chaparral habitats. The common name nopal is Spanis, and is used commonly in Spanish-speaking regions. Nopal is also used to refer to the edible pads.

Opuntias have flat paddle-shaped stem segments called cladodes that grow one on top of the other. The edges and flat surfaces of these cladodes are covered with areoles, which are small areas that have spines, both large and the tiny easily detached spines called glochids. Many Opuntia species have large spines in addition to the glochids, but some are armed only with masses of glochids. Glochids appear to be soft or fuzzy, but anyone who

does touch them immediately regrets doing so. When we had to clear an area for our PV panels, it was where the Opuntia garden was located. I invited neighbors to come and harvest. Unfortunately, I got a voicemail from my poor neighbor who brushed up against the red fuzzy glochids. She was perplexed and challenged

as to how to remove the red furry fuzz on her arm that was quite irritating. Duct tape was her best friend! You may also apply white glue, let it dry and then peel it/them off slowly.

<u>Cultivation</u>: Most are found in warm, dry climates like the Southwest although there are some cold-hardy varieties such as the Eastern prickly pear O. humifusa. They can be as petite as 6-12" to 10-15' tall trees. Flower color varies by type, usually yellow, red or purple. Their edible fruit colors can also vary in shades of red, green and yellow orange. They require full sun, well-draining soil and are extremely drought tolerant and can exist on rainfall.

Propagation: Wear long sleeves and thick gloves when harvesting. A pair of tongs can be handy to hold the pad while cutting it off at a joint with a sharp knife. After allowing the pad to callus over, transplant in well-draining moist soil and don't water for a month. Do not plant too deep or they may rot. Prop up the pad with supports until rooted. Let the soil dry out completely before watering again. When planting in the landscape, be aware of mature size. Plant in areas without paths and walkways.

Pests and Diseases: Opuntia are generally pest free, but if growing conditions are compromised, they can be vulnerable to leaf spot, black spot, bacterial soft rot, and viruses. One of the most common problems that may develop is the Cochineal (Dactylopius sp.) scale insect that feed on opuntia. They produce fluffy white cottony wax that hides their bodies as they feed on the cactus and protects them from the elements (drying out, in particular) and from predators. The fluffy wax also serves as a sail to float on the wind and take the bugs to a new patch of cactus. They produce carminic acid that also helps protect them from predation, especially from ants. The carmine dye, which is red, was prized in the 15th century for coloring fabrics and is still used today. Scraping the scale off (carefully, to avoid the sharp cactus spines) and disposing of them may be possible with a small infestation. You might also be able to wash them off with a water under pressure.
